
MAYBE RISD IS RACIST

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BASIC PREMISES

The intention behind this project is to create an open forum, a safe space where members of the RISD community can experience and view this space in a different light and hopefully help to educate, reflect, and start a discussion about the racism and discrimination the Asian Community at RISD encounters from their peers, professors and faculty.

In Asian culture, we were always taught as kids to stay silent, not cause any trouble and to just "deal with it" if we were wronged. However, as we have seen from recent events, doing nothing is not the answer.

Use these steps as a guide to educate yourselves on a brief history of Asian immigration, the model miniority myth which leads to the current events that are happening today and how it directly relates to our community.

THE CHINESE EXCLUSION ACT OF 1882

was meant to curb the influx of Chinese immigrants to the United States. It suspended Chinese immigration for 10 years and declared Chinese immigrants ineligible for naturalization. Chinese-Americans already in the country challenged the constitutionality of the discriminatory acts, but their efforts failed.

This was the first significant law restricting immigration into the United States. When the exclusion act expired in 1892, Congress extended it for 10 years in the form of the Geary Act. This extension, made permanent in 1902, added restrictions requiring each Chinese resident to register and obtain a certifiate of residence. Without a certificate, she or he would face deporation.

OPEN DOOR POLICY

The Open Door policy was a statement of principles initiated by the United States in 1899 and 1900. It called for protection of equal privileges for all countries trading with China and for the support of Chinese territorial and administrative integrity. The policy increased foreign influence in China, which led to a rise in anti-foreign and anti-colonial sentiment in the country. The backlash against foreigners led to widespread killings of missionaries working in China and an increase in nationalist feelings among the Chinese.

WHY #stopasianhate ISN'T PRODUCTIVE

The term 'stopasianhate' is empty; it doesn't go after the root cause the state and the institutions. The word 'hate' implies to the individual's interpersonal feeling: when Asian racism is more than just hate and was developed to justify imperialism and war. The United States killed millions of Asians overseas. The only way you can maintain public support for that is by dehumanizing Asians at home.

THE MODEL MINIORITY MYTH

The term "model minority" was first used in popular culture over half a century ago. It is most oftenly applied to Asian Americans because this particular immigrant group is often praised for its apparent academic, economic and cultural success.

While it may seem to be a positive characterization of Asian Americans, the model minority myth is actually harmful to both Asian Americans and other immigrant groups because: it crasss differences between individuals, erases differences – both cultural and economic – between Asian groups, relegates Asian Americans to perpetual foreigner status, and erases

MURDER OF VINCENT CHIN

On June 19, 1982, a Chinese American man named Vincent Chin went with friends to a strip club in Detroit to celebrate his upcoming wedding. That night, two white men who apparently thought Chin was Japanese beat him to death. At the killers' trial, the men each received a \$3,000 fine and zero prison time. The light sentencing sparked national outrage and fueled a movement for pan-Asian American rights.

Vincent Chin's murder marked a turning point for Chinese Americans, Japanese Americans and other communities who hadn't previously thought of themselves as "Asian Americans" with common interests.
